## HISTORY AND FACTS OF USS INTREPID (CV-11)

The USS INTREPID (CVA-11) was commissioned August 16, 1943, at Norfolk, Va. On December 3, 1943, she joined the Central Pacific Forces heading for the Marshall Islands and the attack on Kwajalein Atoll, where her fliers, Air Group Six, bombed and strafed that atoll in support of Marine assault forces.

The INTREPID'S second combat operation was against the island of Truk in the central Carolines. Scores of Japanese planes were destroyed in that operation. It was here that the carrier sustained her first damage when hit by an enemy torpedo, tearing a huge gash in her hull and making it necessary for the ship to steer out of the operation by her screws. The hit caused the rudder to be jammed hard to port. Days later it became necessary to rig a sail of hatch covers and canvas on the forecastle, enabling the ship to steer her course back to Pearl Harbor and much needed repairs.

In October, 1944, carrying Air Group Eighteen, during the Battle of Leyte Gulf, the INTREPID suffered her first kamikaze hit. In November, while participating in air strikes against Luzon, two more Japanese suicide planes dove into the INTREPID'S flight deck; however, the carrier was able to return to Pearl Harbor once again and then on to Hunter's Point, Calif., for major repairs.

With Air Group Ten now on board, the INTREPID embarked for Okinawa in February 1945. Beginning April 1, the INTREPID'S planes flew an extended series of support missions at Okinawa and other islands in the area. At this time the carrier sustained her fourth kamikaze hit, which opened a huge hole in the flight deck. The carrier again proceeded to Hunter's Point for repairs, arriving May 19, 1945.

The INTREPID returned to active duty July 5th and was at Eniwetok at the time of the Japanese surrender. She returned to the West Coast later that year and was decommissioned on August 15, 1946.

The INTREPID was given "sure" credit for shooting down 13 enemy planes and assisting in the destruction of five others. Her three Air Groups accounted for 309 planes shot down — 495 damaged — 69 ships sunk and probably sank or damaged 215 enemy ships.

Early in 1950 the INTREPID was ordered out of reserve and sent, via the Panama Canal, to Newport News Shipyard for modernization. She was recommissioned as an attack carrier (CVA) June 18, 1954 and joined the fleet in October.

The INTREPID has undergone a 40 million dollar reconversion and is now a much heavier and much stronger vessel, capable of carrying the Navy's latest jet fighters and bombers.

A streamlined island, nerve center of a carrier, has been constructed. It offers less wind resistance and better flight and navigational control. Two deck-edge elevators, leaving only one center-line elevator, clear both flight and hangar decks for greater capacity. An escalator, from the hangar deck to flight deck, has been installed for the use of pilots manning their planes.

Since recommissioning the INTREPID has been operating with AIRLANT and the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.


It shows us when we stood on guard in the very forefront of our country's defenses, as "any man has stood throughout our history against those who would threaten our homes, our families, and our way of life."

A graduate of the class of 1930 at the United States Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland, Captain Blackburn was designated a naval aviator in 1932. He served in various carrier, observation and patrol squadrons of the fleet and was Staff Aviation Officer for the commander of the first American task force deployed to the European Theater in the early days of the war. In June, 1942, he commissioned Patrol 201 as Commanding Officer, one of the first Navy Patrol Squadrons to receive PBM aircraft. Following a tour of duty at the Bureau of Aeronautics, Washington, D. C., he reported aboard the carrier USS RANDOLPH as Navigator and later became its Executive Officer.

Following the war he was a member of the Armed Services Petroleum Board, attended the Air War College and was Assistant Chief of Staff for Operations, Training, and Plans for Commander, Air Force, Atlantic Fleet. Captain Blackburn was Commanding Officer of the USS DUXBURY BAY, Flagship of Commander, Middle East Force, prior to reporting to the National War College. From that assignment he reported to Commander, Carrier Division FOUR as Chief of Staff. Following this he reported for duty in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, his last duty station before reporting as Commanding Officer of the USS INTREPID.

Captain Blackburn was born in Seattle, Washington, and now resides in Washington, D. C.

## *Executive Officer*

The INTREPID'S Executive Officer, Commander R. Semmes, was born in Montgomery, Ala., and attended high school in Huntsville, Ala., before entering the Naval Academy, from which he graduated in 1938. Cdr. Semmes then served as a line officer in the Pacific Fleet two years before entering flight training. After receiving his wings he was assigned to the aviation unit in the USS ST. LOUIS and was at Pearl Harbor on 7 December, 1941. During the war he participated in the Marshall Island and Gilbert Island raids and spent 7 months in an Aleutian patrol squadron.

Following the war he held various staff positions and was Commanding Officer of VC-98 in 1944-45 and VP-21 in 1949-51.

Cdr. Semmes was Deputy Director of Aircraft Logistics X in the Navy Department from 1951 to 1953 and was later Executive Officer of VX-1 in Key West, Fla. He reported aboard the USS INTREPID in 1955 as Executive Officer relieving Cdr. H. A. Rowe.




# Naples, ITALY








## Genoa

Fighting EIGHTY TWO'S IRON MEN were the INTREPID'S primary night fighters and long range special weapons delivery team. Commanded by Cdr. J. A. Shirley the squadron flew the navy's famed "Banshee" twin-jet aircraft.

Activated from reserve squadron VF-742 in February 1951, then stationed at Jacksonville, VF-82 (now from Oceana) flew Panthers and Corsairs before they acquired their vital dual mission with the Banshee.

Maintenance crews constantly improved their performance after they and the birds had become acclimatized to the rigors and inconveniences of shipboard life and reached their summit of performance during such exercises as "Thunderhead" and "Maltese."

It was generally agreed that the cruise had been very profitable and that the USS INTREPID couldn't have been a better host to the IRON MEN.



Fighter Squadron SIXTY ONE, commissioned as VF-17 at Norfolk, Virginia, on 1 January 1943, has a long and distinguished history. Born in the days of desperate fighting for Guadalcanal, its first Commanding Officer was Commander Tommy Blackburn. (He is the brother of the USS INTREPID'S present Skipper, Captain Paul P. Blackburn, Jr.) Entering the war in the Solomon Islands in 1943, it was placed ashore and operated from New Georgia and Bougainville. It was equipped with Chance Vought Corsairs and played a major part in the defeat of Japanese air power in that area, achieving 154 confirmed victories. The fame won by the Squadron in those fierce days, when it became known as "Blackburn's Irregulars," has remained with it and its pilots still wear the defiant "Jolly Rogers" skull and cross-bones insignia.

In April 1944, having completed an intensive tour of combat duty, the squadron returned to the United States to regroup. Assigned new F6F-3's, the squadron returned to Far Eastern waters aboard the USS HORNET as part of the famed task Force 58. It participated in strikes against Iwo Jima, Okinawa, and Japanese Mainland. During this second tour the squadron achieved 160 confirmed air victories.

After the war the squadron was redesignated Fighter Squadron SIXTY ONE and was assigned to duty with the Atlantic Fleet. It has embarked aboard the USS CORAL SEA, USS

**FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT**, **USS VALLEY FORGE**, **USS MIDWAY**, **USS LAKE CHAMPLAIN** and the **USS INTREPID**. While at sea, the squadron has operated in the Caribbean Sea, Arctic Ocean, North Sea and Mediterranean waters. It has participated in Operation LantFlex, Grand Slam, Mainbrace and Junestrikex.

As a Jet Fighter Squadron, VF-61 was originally assigned F9F-2 Panthers in April 1950. These were subsequently replaced with F9F-5, -6, -7, FJ-3, and now have Grumman's latest F9F-8 Cougar. Since 1950 the squadron has flown about 25,000 jet hours.

A recent outstanding performance by VF-61 was the attainment of 17 "E" awards for gunnery during AIR-LANT competition in Guantanamo Bay, Cuba, in December, 1955.

As a Day Fighter Squadron, the primary mission of VF-61 is to establish and maintain local air superiority by destruction of enemy aircraft. Additional duties are to conduct offensive operations against enemy aircraft, attack surface targets, provide fighter escort for attack aircraft, provide support for amphibious or land operations, visual air reconnaissance and maintain day, night, and adverse weather aircraft carrier operational efficiency.



Attack Squadron EIGHT FIVE commanded by CDR. C. H. JAEP, III, USN, was the first squadron on the east coast to be 100% special weapons qualified. Flying the durable and dependable AD-6 "SKYRAIDERS" VA-85 was the first squadron to provide its own pathfinder aircraft having two AD-5N's in the unit. Within the Air Group, the squadron was the first to qualify all its pilots both night and day, in carrier operations.

During sixteen operating days in June 1956, the squadron flew a total of 980 hours off the ship that included participation in NATO Exercise "THUNDERHEAD." The pilots saw Europe from a different angle than the usual on low level strikes off the ship. With its AD-4Q and flying the ship's "Queen" the squadron provided tow service for the task force.

The majority of the pilots in VA-85 were on their first cruise and the successful showing of the squadron indicated a thorough, well balanced training program prior to cruise time. Another important factor was the outstanding accomplishments of the squadron's maintenance department in keeping a very high percentage of aircraft availability each day. "Teamwork," from plane captain on up through the man at the controls was the primary reason for a happy Med cruise in 1956.



On 16 May 1956, Heavy Attack Squadron FIVE Detachment 33 alias "The Savage Sons of Sanford," relieved VAH-9 while the ship was cruising in the Eastern Mediterranean.

The detachment is led by CDR. JOSEPH M. TULLY, JR., USN, Squadron Executive Officer, and is made up of 12 other officers and sixty enlisted men.

Detachment 33 is second only to the helicopter as a guardian angel, in that it is able to refuel the ship's jet aircraft while airborne. In reality, this is only a secondary


mission, for the AJ is primarily a long range, all weather, high altitude heavy attack bomber, capable of delivering atomic weapons far from its launch point.

The AJ is the only carrier based aircraft which consistently flies transoceanic flights to meet its commitments. Up until early this year it was the largest carrier based aircraft in the world. At the present time it is overshadowed by the A3D "Skywarrior," which will become VAH-5's operational aircraft in the very near future.

Subdued beneath the glitter and excitement of, aircraft landing and taking off, the boom of the guns, the activity in CIC, Air OPS Pri Fly and on the Bridge. Deep down in the bowels of the ship is the almost forgotten man, the Engineer! These are the men who operate, maintain, and repair the boilers, engines, generators, compressors and fix damage to the ship. These are the men in the firerooms who make the steam that ceases to flow only when the ship goes into drydocks or for a major yard overhaul or conversion. 
## *Navigation*
